Mineral Evolution

Presented by Marcus Origlieri

Mineral Evolution is a new framework for understanding the mineral kingdom. It attempts to explain the origin of all mineral species by recording the appearance of the first mineral species and connects this appearance with geologic processes. The process begins with the Big Bang event, with atoms being created and cooling to form the first mineral. Once matter cools and starts to coalesce, pressure and heat create additional minerals while the crust of the planet is forming. **Read the details on pg 5.**

The past three decades have seen much progress in lunar science, driven mainly by orbital probes, lunar meteorites, and ever-improving technology for sample analysis. Because the Moon's surface is well-sampled and not highly diverse, limited progress can be expected from additional orbiters, unmanned rovers, and even sample-acquisition missions, unless the landing targets is a geologically novel area, and/or includes Apollo-15/16/17 style selective and ample sampling by astronauts. The good news is, China and the USA are racing to a second era of manned exploration; and technically challenging unmanned-probes may be seen as relatively inexpensive complements to manned exploration. Beginning Wire Wrapping***

WIRE WRAPPING is another way to turn your cabochon into jewelry without use of a torch and soldering or drilling a hole into it. Wire wrapping is a creative way not only to hold a stone (and/or other elements such as beads, beach glass, or wooden elements), but also the patterns of wire that are used to hold these elements can be very decorative and creative in their own right.

Using special pliers (often two pair simultaneously), loops of various gauges and colors of wire are tightly drawn, twisted, and woven together to form the piece. Commercial wires are available in copper, silver, and other metals in a host of colors and gauges. One can make pendants, rings, bracelets, etc.

Marcus Origlieri is a mineral collector who grew up in southern California. His mentors include **Ralph Monell, Pete Bancroft, Cal Graeber,** and **Bill Larson.** He studied chemistry at the University of California at San Diego (B.S.) and Geosciences (mineralogy) at the University of Arizona (Ph.D.).

Among **Marcus'** longtime research interests is the formation of "human-mediated" minerals, which occurs at the intersection of human activity and geological processes. (Read more about this geoscience concept on the next page.)

Human-mediated mineral formation is seen in many ancient bronze sculptures. Conditions of a sculpture's burial environment will invariably initiate chemical reactions with bronze alloys to form corrosion products, or patina, over its exposed or contact surfaces. The corrosion products identified on this ancient Roman bronze sculpture included the copper chloride minerals nantokite, atacamite, paratacamite, clinoatacamite, botallackite, and anarkite. What, you ask, is an anthropogenic mineral? If you attend **Dr. Marcus Origlieri's** lecture series in November, you just may find out. Human activity is responsible for the formation of about 4% of **IMA**-recognized mineral species known today. The list is growing rapidly and according to **Dr. Robert M. Hazen**, mineralogist at **Carnegie Institution for Science** and leading researcher on **Mineral Evolution**, so-called "human-mediated" minerals account for greater mineral diversity on Earth "than on all previously studied planets and moons in our solar system."

Mining is one of the most significant activities that gives rise to anthropogenic minerals. However, this class of minerals also includes lab-grown synthetics and byproducts of manufacturing and engineering processes, as well as weathering, decomposition, and other alteration-inducing processes.

At least 208 minerals of more than 5,500 minerals officially recognized by the **International Mineralogical Association (IMA)** are anthropogenic minerals. Johnkoivulaite. A new mineral discovered by gemologist **Nay Myo** in Mogok Valley, Myanmar, has been named in honor of **GIA** analytical microscopist **John Koivula**. The color-change mineral is a member of the beryl group. It was named for the renowned gemologist in recognition of his pioneering contributions to gemological research and photomicrography of gemstone inclusions over a career spanning more than 40 years. **Koivula** is an honorary lifetime member of **SDMG** and was a regular contributor to the annual **Sinkankas Symposium** during its first decade, helping to make it one of the best gem-mineral symposia of its kind in North America.

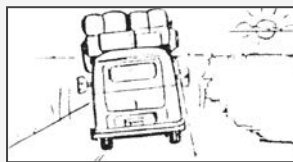

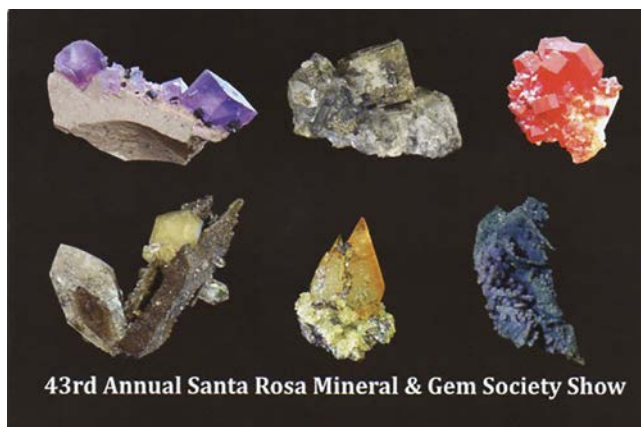

May 20, 2019

In attendance: President Jim Parrish and Board members Andy Anderson, John Kruzal, Wayne Moorhead, Doug Peeler, Anne Schafer, Dave Smith, Jennifer Stapp, Denny Turner and Paul Williams. There was not a quorum. **Excused:** Rocio Bergum, Stephanie Griffin, Bob Hancock, Ellen Riceman, Sally Parrish and Jill Williamson. **Absent:** Donna Beers, Donna Casey, Melissa Ordway and Dee Smith. **Guest:** Letty Evans.

Membership: Membership Secretary Angie Cannon reported via email that SDMG had 771 members as of May 18th.

Juniors: Dave Smith reported that the Juniors' hosted General Meeting was great, with three Juniors in attendance (possible, since the meeting was held on a Friday night). Gerry Alvarado presented an excellent program on gemstone inclusions. Attendance at the meeting: 40.

The Juniors also entered and prepared an exhibit for the Fair, "Collecting Cabs," with Angie Cannon helping with liners and risers.

SVAC Liaison: Jim Parrish reported that Spanish Village patched some potholes in the asphalt near the SDMG Building, including some under the drip edges.

President: Jim Parrish announced Dee Smith's wish to resign from the Board of Directors. Motion carried unanimously to accept her resignation, effective immediately. Jim to write thank-you letter to Dee Smith for her service.

Membership: Membership Secretary Angie Cannon reported via email that SDMG had 786 members, and renewals were being sent out.

Paul Williams made a motion to raise all adult membership dues to \$30, beginning Jan. 1, 2020. Motion carried, 13 to 1.
