COVID-19 UPDATE

(updated April 6, 2020)

We have been closely monitoring public health updates on the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, and we regret having to CLOSE the SDMG Building to ALL regularly scheduled activites and SUSPENSION of SDMG-sponsored events until further notice.

We are concerned that our members and their families stay safe and healthy, so we are following the direction of U.S. government agencies including the CDC, FDA, National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) as well as city, county and state agencies.

The duration of risk to public health due to COVID-19 cannot be estimated at this time, but it may last for weeks or even months. Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of NIAID and top health official on the President's Coronavirus Task Force, has said repeatedly, "The virus is driving the timeline." He also cautioned the public that resuming normal activities too soon may cause a resurgence of coronavirus cases that had been flattening or trending downward. If this happens the pandemic will be prolonged. Cutting the chain of transmission through physical distancing is the best thing the public can do at this time to help bring it to an end.

William Tirk Scholarship

Jennifer Hansen is a 2nd year MFA candidate in the Jewelry + Metals program at SDSU. She has a BA in Art History from UC Berkeley and spent many years working as the assistant to the head of the Jewelry Department of the San Rafael Auction Gallery. Her work explores visual perception and boundaries, what we choose to show versus what we conceal.

She grew up in England raised by parents who were buying and selling antiques partially as a side business but mostly out of love for old things and the stories they tell. This early exposure fostered a life long connection with Victorian and Georgian jewelry which continues to inform her work. The hidden messages in Victorian jewelry and the concealment of Georgian lover's eye brooches are themes repeated in her work.

She discovered metalsmithing by accident when she first started her undergraduate studies. An illustration

major in a heavily impacted program she was unable to register for drawing classes and took the only art classes that had space, jewelry and metals. It was instant love. Unfortunately that jewelry program lost its funding and she eventually switched to an Art History major but she always maintained a jewelry practice.

Many years later while volunteering as a teaching assistant in the College of Marin jewelry department she came to realize that education is her happy place and what she wants to do with her life. Two years ago she took a leap of faith and applied to graduate school in pursuit of a life teaching Jewelry + Metals at a college level. ***Interior Celebrates One Year Anniversary
of Historic Public Lands Bill***

WASHINGTON – Today, the Department of the Interior celebrates the one-year anniversary of President Donald Trump signing into law the John D. Dingell Jr. Conservation, Management, and Recreation Act (S.47, the Dingell Act). The Dingell Act is the single most important and wide-ranging public lands management law to be passed with bipartisan support in over a decade. The Act:

- Encompassed more than 100 individual bills;
- Permanently reauthorized the Land and Water Conservation Fund;
- Created new Federal authorities to assist the Department in managing endangered and invasive species;
- Called for increasing access to public lands for hunting, fishing and recreational shooting; and
- Advanced a wide variety of conservation and recreation initiatives for the American people.

“When President Donald Trump signed this bipartisan bill into law, he furthered his indelible legacy of balancing natural resources conservation and responsibly expanding recreation opportunities on our public lands,” **said Secretary Bernhardt**. “I am proud that the Department of the Interior and its bureaus have worked exhaustively this past year to meet our goals for implementing this historic public lands law for the American people.”

Soon after the bill was signed into law, Secretary Bernhardt signed [Secretary’s Order 3374](#) establishing a task force to prioritize the implementation of the Dingell Act and ensure consistency among all offices and bureaus within the Department. Secretary Bernhardt’s Order required actionable steps be taken and an implementation plan created to make sure the Department met all timelines laid out in the historic lands law.

Recreation

- BLM released a series of interactive online maps designed to promote climbing and other recreational opportunities on BLM-managed public lands.
- NPS extended the Lewis and Clark National Historic trail 1,200 miles and moved its terminus from Wood River, Illinois to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.
- BLM is managing the newly-established 92,000-acre Spangler Hills Off-Highway Vehicle Area, which expanded motorized recreation in San Bernardino County,

California by approximately 35,000-acres. BLM is now permitting competitive OHV events, some with over 200 racers, covering 40 miles of BLM-managed public lands in the new area.

- BLM California has begun work on the newly established, 82,000-acre Vinagre Wash Special Recreation Management Area, public lands designated to enhance and preserve OHV recreation, horseback riding, mountain biking and hiking while preserving surrounding wilderness landscapes. Over 50 channel posts and signs have been installed around the Milpitas Wash, Palo Verde and Buzzards Peak wildernesses to guide and inform public recreation in Imperial County.
- Visitors to the newly-designated Santa Cruz Valley National Heritage Area in Arizona now enjoy outdoor recreation, bird-watching, astronomy, heritage site tours, local wineries and heritage foods. The NHA includes attractions like the BLM's [Las Cienegas National Conservation Area](#), and [Juan Bautista de Anza National Historic Trail](#), which parallels the Santa Cruz River.
- BLM is managing approximately 28,000 acres of public lands in the Juniper Flats area of San Bernardino County, California for public recreation. Juniper Flats, located between the Mojave Desert and the San Bernardino National Forest, encompasses a mix of public and private lands that host a variety of unique plants from both the desert and the mountains. The area provides public recreational opportunities for mountain biking, camping, hiking and off-highway vehicle trails.

Parks

- NPS, FWS and BLM implemented the new Every Kid Outdoors Act by creating a website and announcing the new program at the Washington Monument and Yellowstone National Park (Sec. 9001).
- NPS re-designated the Golden Spike National Historic Site (Sec. 2205).
- NPS established the Pearl Harbor National Memorial as a distinct unit of the National Park System (Sec. 2206).
- NPS opened the Statue of Liberty Museum to increase accessibility and enhance the visitor educational experience (Sec. 2206).

The Department is entrusted with stewarding more than 500 million acres of our Nation's Federal lands and natural resources for the benefit and enjoyment of current and future generations of Americans. By virtue of President Trump signing the Dingell Act into law a year ago, the Department has furthered its conservation stewardship mission and trust to the American people in fulfilling the merits of this law.

Mineral of the Month

Anatase

Anatase is usually found in masses. But it does form some very nice, four-sided, pyramid-like crystals. Sometimes the crystals can be short and fat, and sometimes they are long and thin.

Anatase is a very mineral with a chemical formula of TiO₂ (titanium dioxide). Two other minerals also have the same formula. They are Rutile and Brookite. When these minerals have the same chemical formula but crystallize in different crystal systems, they are called "dimorphs" if there are different minerals "twins" if they are the same mineral. Therefore, Anatase, Rutile and Brookite are trimorphs. Some mineralogists use a single word and call them "polymorphs" which means "many forms".

An old name for Anatase is no longer in use. Octahedrite. This name was first given because many crystals have eight faces and look like an octahedron crystal. You might see this name in old mineral books, but it is no longer used in the field of mineralogy.

Anatase is made in the laboratory; this is because it can be used in some special electronic equipment. One of what are called semi-conductors. A semi-conductor is a material that conducts electricity, but not as strongly as a metal like copper, silver or gold.





Hang in there, Mini Miners. We will be able to go out again before too long. And once we can leave our houses, we can go digging for minerals and attend mineral club meetings again!


What Mineral Am I?

In ancient Roman days, I was used to pay soldiers for their work: I was their "salary." Every animal needs a little bit of me in their body to be healthy. But if a person has too much of me in their blood, I can cause high blood pressure. When pure, I am colorless. But I can be other colors, like pink, when impurities are in me. In very special situations, changes in my crystal structure can cause me to be blue or purple. My common name is "salt."

BLM Temporarily Closes Developed Recreation Facilities in California

Despite facility closures, millions of acres of BLM-managed public lands across California remain open to enjoy, as long as you do so responsibly. Visitors may continue to enjoy their BLM managed trails and open spaces in California while following recommendations from the CDC and local and state public health authorities. Social distancing recommendations are extremely important to reducing the transmission of COVID-19 and may require that visitors avoid public lands during high-use times, such as weekends. Please limit any group activities to members of your household, and keep your total party to 10 or fewer participants. At all times, maintain a distance of 6 feet or more from other people. 2020 – 2022 SLATE

SDMG OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

The Nominating Committee has selected the following slate of four (4) officers and sixteen (16) directors for the two-year term from July 1, 2020, to June 30, 2022. 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
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
