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





THE PROGRAM for November is “**Lets Talk Treatments.**” Group discussion will cover many of known gem treatments. This topic is quite wide-ranging and will need participation from everyone, as few people know about most or all treatment methods and recent trends in the market. For example, one GSSD member reports that a treatment used to produce “Mystic Topaz”

was, in fact, applied to a cut beryl. Watch out for items marked “0.925 China, with Moissanite.” Misleading labels appear all-too-often giving an incorrect gem identification or assay, and they sometimes omit disclosure about treatments. There will be refreshments, and if you care to bring something to share it will be appreciated.

DONA DIRLAM will give a presentation on “**World-class gems at the Taj Mahal: Sources and trade routes.**” She will present a gemological survey of the gems associated with the Taj Mahal, one of the architectural wonders of the world and a Unesco World Heritage site. The white marble mausoleum was built by the Mughal emperor Shah Jahan in the 17th century to memorialize his beloved wife Mumtaz Mahal. Under Shah Jahan’s patronage, the art of parchin kari (stone inlay) and gem carving reached its apogee in Mughal India. Ms. Dirlam’s fascinating topic is covered in a **GIA Gems & Gemology** article from 2019, “[Gemstones in the Era of the Taj Mahal and the Mughals](#),” which she co-authored with **Chris L. Rogers** and **Robert Weldon**.

About the speaker. Dona Mary Dirlam has been GIA Librarian Emerita since 2017. Previously, she was the Director and creator of the Richard T. Liddicoat Gemological Library and Information Center at GIA’s worldwide headquarters in Carlsbad, California. She holds a B.S. in Earth Sciences from the University of Minnesota (Minneapolis) and a M.S. in

Geology and Geophysics from the University of Wisconsin (Madison). Ms. Dirlam is a GIA Graduate Gemologist (GG) and a Fellow of the Gemmological Association of Great Britain. With GIA’s support, she built the largest gem and jewelry library in the world. She received GIA’s highest honor, the Richard T. Liddicoat Award for Distinguished Achievement, as well as several lifetime achievement awards. She has co-authored 14 **Gems & Gemology** articles and co-authored/co-edited a book entitled **The Splendour & Science of Pearls** with **Robert Weldon**. She collaborated with **Dr. James Shigley** and Robert Weldon to produce **Selecting Gem Rough: A Guide for Artisanal Miners** in English and Kiswahili.



They own two federal mining claims near Barstow, California, which have produced gold, silver, turquoise, and azure malachite. The presentation will be about their experiences prospecting and mining in the Southern California desert, their discovery of emeralds in the Julian Mining District, California, and opal and turquoise in Australia. Cut of the Month



The cutting of Hexohalo is very simple and produces a very neat effect for only 61 facets. The design shows a hexagon in a hexagon in a hexagon – sort of like the endless mirrors.

The Crown C3 facets overcut the C1 tips and though it is subjective to the cutter, I would stick to judging the depth by the diagram.

This cut was designed for garnet, corundum and higher refractive index material. Changing the angles +3 degrees on the pavilion can be used for quartz, beryl, tourmaline, and other gems, but the effect is somewhat diminished.


I have not test cut this design yet, having just envisioned it on the drive home from class, but I know it will work as shown.

In Memoriam: Lois Lukasky

1926 – 2023

LOIS LUKASKY, a beloved lifetime member of SDMG passed away peacefully in her sleep on September 13, 2023. She joined SDMG in November, 1989 and started teaching the Junior Division in 1993. She taught juniors and adults alike, retiring in 2017 after 24 years of volunteer service as the Juniors' class instructor. She loved sharing and passing along her passion and knowledge of gems, minerals, and the lapidary arts to the younger generation. She absolutely loved what she did.

As her memory began to slip away from her, Lois's son and daughter-in-law, David and Janice, helped her move into San Miguel Ranch, a senior living residence in Chula Vista. She had her own apartment and continued to live life as she always had, happy with her days filled to the brim with activities. It didn't matter where she was, she just let her life take in the best this world had to offer and enjoyed it to the hilt. She wasn't one to hold onto the negative life experiences. Janice observed, "Her skin was made of Teflon. When the negative things came her way, she let them slide right off." She didn't have a care in the world, except to live life to its fullest every day that she woke up.

There were times Lois would sweep the floors at San Miguel Ranch, and when asked what she was doing she'd say, she had walked to school (SDMG) and was cleaning up after her classes. The staff said, "They wished they had 100 more residents like Lois." She was so pleasant to be around and never got mean. She lived at the Ranch 4½ years and never once complained about anything. She knew she was living on a locked unit, but she didn't mind. She came out of her room everyday ready to do whatever activity there was to do. She engaged the staff with chatter whenever she walked by and talked to people with a positive and caring heart.

Unfortunately, COVID hit San Miguel Ranch and on June 5th, 2023, Lois tested positive. Within two weeks she could still stand up but found herself unable to walk, which forced her into a wheelchair. It also affected her speaking ability, but to everyone's delight she eventually recovered and once again became talkative. The doctors diagnosed Lois with congestive

heart failure and kidney failure, which impeded her from making a full recovery. Janice said COVID was definitely the turning point for her spiral downward. She was placed on hospice and both Ranch and Hospice staff gave her excellent care. She wanted her hair to look nice, so the staff were very attentive to her concern. She even had her nails done in the last three

days of her life. Her caretakers adored Lois. She lost all interest in food, but Lois still enjoyed her coffee. Janice said, “Fortunately, she was not in any pain and remained happy to the very end.”

She was cremated after her death, and her ashes were interred at Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery in Point Loma, on October 5, one day after her 97th birthday. Her remains were interred with those of her late husband Gordon where they face the bay, with the beautiful Pacific Ocean on the other side – a perfect setting and view for a special lady.

Lois touched many lives throughout her lifetime, and I know many people would say they are very pleased to have had the opportunity to get to know her. Denny Turner said, “She was an amazing lady. I do recall that in her earlier life she was an aircraft pilot and had flown some special trips both solo and with others.¹ I wish I knew more about that part of her life. There are many, many Juniors who got their first experience handling rocks and gems with Lois. Always to be remembered; never to be forgotten.” Wayne and Peggy Leibitzke, who now reside in Wisconsin said, “She was a dear lady and had a servant’s heart.” A very special lady with a love of teaching the younger generation. Zak Kinsten was one such kid who had a lot of respect for her and cherished his time under her tutelage.
